One Page Synopsis

"Spiral" is a story of two people on different sides putting aside enmity to save a cosmonaut suck in space it's a tale of hope and humanity.

Spiral takes a different direction to what happened in our own timeline.

It is set at a point in 20th century history where mankind came closest to annihilation and self-extinction.

September 1983 - A Soviet radar operator sees contact that he declares is a US missile launch as a first strike and the Kremlin orders a full nuclear retaliation on this in error. Most of the world's major centres and militaries are vapourised. What's left are some small pockets of advanced technology, trying to keep the fire of civilisation alive.

Launched just prior to the massive world ending nuclear exchanged, marooned in orbit through all of this is a young man, Captain Dmitry Panov, trapped aboard his miniature one man shuttle, "Spiral". For several weeks, he attempts to find some form of life on Earth. His only company is Misha, the stuffed bear given to him by his wife before launch.

Running low on air and food, he manages to break through the static. On the ground, in a part of Western Australia undamaged by nuclear warfare, a young woman, Katrina, on a radio is scanning cities over the world yielding only static and silence. She receives Dmitry's cry for help and rushes to her superiors for assistance.

As Katrina tries to obtain coordinates for him to safely return to Earth, she must battle the bitter hatred by officials of a now enemy. Katrina must use her skills and knowledge and has to resort to desperate measures to bring Dmitry back to Earth.



Director's Statement Steven Kerr



'Spiral" is an idea that I've been musing on over a few years, after a camping trip to Coral Bay took me past the now inactive Tracking station in Carnarvon. Looking into its' past revealed a connection to the early US space program. I daydreamed on how a place like this would be isolated in the event of a major global catastrophe. A last centre of advanced technology and outpost of civilization, alone. If the survivors here, listening for anyone else alive, picked up signals from becople stranded in orbit, what would they do?

What could they do? Being a Cold War kid, I was all too aware in the 1990's about the story of "Doomsday". How during September 1983, a Soviet Rocket Forces radar station detected what looked to be US missile launches. Officer Lt. Col. Stanislav Petrov correctly ascertained these were an error picked up by Molniya satellites. Should less cool heads have prevailed, civilisation would have been vapourised and I would not be writing this.

My influences for "Spiral" come from stories of history and real objects and places, but reimagining them. As for directors the works of Verhoeven, Lucas, Kubrick and Kurosawa rank highly in my influences. Alfonso Cuaron's "Gravity" has been a great inspiration as well.

"Spiral" is important because it shows humans both at their finest and worst. A timely reminder of the existential threat humankind poses itself if we can't get along and do not leave Earth.

The notion we are confined to this planet should be alarming. Perhaps we can see a vision of the better nature we are capable of, and act on it. To do something good. Hopefully, we can bridge our divides, right our wrongs and take our place amongst the stars. That is my hope and our birthright.
